the preparation, production, and distribution of this catalog, and some programs receive grants paid from your dues dollars. Attending NEOEA Day programs, most of which provide growth opportunities at lowerthan-usual prices, is an excellent way to get some of your NEOEA dues dollars back!

Organization. This catalog is divided into two main sections:

- professional development (pages 1-4);
- personal development (pages 5-6).

"Professional development" refers to things that make us more effective on the job. This was one of the original purposes of our organization when it was founded as NEOTA back in 1869, and it still comprises the largest portion of our NEOEA Day offerings. "Personal development" refers to items intended to enrich the lives of members both on and off the job.

Registration. Each program description identifies a chairperson, along with a phone number for contacting that chairperson and an address for sending in registration forms and payment. A few programs are independently funded so that they have no registration fee; however, almost all programs require registration. You register for NEOEA Day programs by using the registration form below. Do not send registration forms or fees to NEOEA; send them to the address listed in the program description.

Lunch. Please note luncheon arrangements which will be indicated in the program description. Some programs include lunch; some provide a lunch break during which you can eat a "bag lunch" or purchase lunch onsite; others provide a lunch period in which you eat offsite.

> rofessional Development Credit. Since implementing local professional development committees (LPDCs), Ohio no longer certifies CEU (continuing education unit) providers. Your LPDC determines whether it will recognize a particular activity for professional development credit on your own individual professional development plan (IPDP). To facilitate that process, NEOEA provides presenters with certificates of participation. Presenters distribute those certificates at the end of the program; please don't ask for them earlier. You will need to work with your own LPDC to determine whether a program is appropriate for your IPDP, and you will need to comply with any deadlines that your LPDC may require.

The ABC's of AI: What Educators Need to Know: The capabilities and availability of Artificial Intelligence tools have skyrocketed in recent years. It is critical for schools to consider how to best address and use AI in education. In this session we will explore the ABC's of AI including: A) About AI (what AI tools are currently available and how they work), B) Benefits of AI (practical and

powerful ways to use AI for teaching and learning) and C) Concerns of AI (how to address potential misuses of this transformative technology).

The Al Toolbox: Best Al Tools for Schools: ChatGPT and Gemini are wonderful, but what other Al tools are available? Thankfully there are many educational Al resources that build on top of these models with tools that are free, provide extra functionality and features, and make the process easier and more convenient for educators. In this session we will explore many of these tools including EduaideAl, Diffit, Twee, MagicSchoolAl, Conker, Curipod, Almanack, QuestionWell, Brisk, Goblin Tools, SchoolAl, Mizou, EnlightenAl, Snorkl, Sorcerer, and more.

Artificial Intelligence / Natural Misuse - Managing Al in Schools: As beneficial as Al is, it also comes with challenges and the potential for misuse. In this session we will explore ways to address academic integrity concerns, tools and strategies to help monitor Al use, proper citation for Al generated content, ways to encourage positive use of Al in the classrooms, developing your own class set of Al guidelines for students, alternative assessment options, addressing Al bias and inaccuracies, student data privacy, identifying fake content, evaluating Al tools, and more.

Super Tutor: Al to Support all Learners: Artificial intelligence tools are a powerful way to provide support, accessibility, and accommodations for all learners for all of their needs. In this session we will explore ways Al can assist with individualized Al tutoring, personalized explanations, reading comprehension, summarization, writing supports, custom feedback, problem solving, review, and much more.




